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Chevy Chase Village Post Office

The United States Postal Service (USPS) announced over the summer that it is considering the closure of over 3,600 post offices across the country as it looks to address a decline in usage and a reported structural deficit. Included on the list of post offices being considered for possible closure is the post office located in the Village Hall. No official decision has been made and it is unlikely that all 3,600 named post offices will be chosen for closure.

As expected, this news was alarming to many residents who treasure this post office for its ease of use, convenient location and parking, and community feel. The Board of Managers understands residents concerns, and assures the community that we will do all we can to ensure this post office remains open.

This is not the first time that USPS has attempted to close a local post office. Last year, the USPS announced closure of the Friendship Heights Post Office located on Wisconsin Avenue across from Saks Fifth Avenue. This closure was averted when local elected officials and residents of the community showed an outpouring of support for the post office by increasing usage and by circulating a petition for signatures.

It is important to note that there is a process for the closure of a post office including a specific notice requirement and the opportunity for the community to be heard. The Postal Service must consider the effect of such closing on the community served and the employees who work at that specific location, and the expected economic savings.

The Village Board and staff are closely monitoring the USPS' efforts in this matter and are currently researching information regarding our location's usage and annual revenues and expenses in comparison to other nearby locations. Residents are urged to patronize the Village Post Office as the gross revenues at each location are highly relevant to the final decisions on closure.

When more information is available, the Village will host a meeting open to residents of the Village and the greater community for further discussion and so we can work together to preserve our local post office. In the interim, we will keep the community informed of any developments through the *Crier* and the Village's website at www.chevychasevillagemd.gov.

Over the past couple months Maryland-National Capital Park & Planning Commission Crews and Contractors have been working to clean up the Chevy Chase Open Space property (formally known as the Wohlfarth property) to remove non-native invasive shrubs, vines and small trees and to improve site lines into and out

Update on Capital and Utility Infrastructure Projects

Sidewalk Replacements & Handicap Ramp Upgrade Project

Over the past couple of years, the Village Board of Managers, Public Works Committee and staff have been working to develop a comprehensive plan to replace the existing sidewalks throughout the Village. At the Board's May 16 and June 13 regular meetings, Village staff presented reports on the number of sidewalk trip-hazards and proposed schedule to complete sidewalk and handicap ramp upgrades. The Village Board authorized construction contracts for the replacement of all sidewalks over the next four (4) years, which have not already been replaced by the Village Public Works Department or Maryland State Highway Administration, and to install Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliant handicap ramps during the current fiscal year (which began July 1, 2011). This project is in keeping with Village policy to actively use the revenues generated through the Village's *SafeSpeed* Program (photo speed enforcement program along Connecticut Avenue) to improve pedestrian safety.

During the month of August the Village's contractor, D&F Construction, Inc. has been replacing and upgrading the handicap ramps throughout the Village with the exception of the ramps on Connecticut Avenue and Brookville Road as these ramps have already been upgraded. Now that the new ramps are compliant with Federal Americans with Disabilities Act regulations the Village's sidewalk contractor, Capitol Hardscapes, will begin replacing sidewalks throughout the Village the week of September 12. The Board unanimously approved the use of the *PineHall Pathway Full Range Clay Brick* paver for use throughout the Village, regardless of the material that is being replaced.

During construction the contractors will ensure that pedestrian access is maintained on at least one side of the street at all times (in areas where sidewalks exist on each side of the street). Throughout the multi-year project, the our Public Works staff will continue to monitor for and repair sidewalks deemed to be immediate hazards.

We thank you for your patience as we undertake this project to make the Village a safer community for all.

WSSC Water Main Replacements

Over the next 18 months, the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission (WSSC) will begin a multi-phase project to replace, upgrade, and, in some cases, relocate two miles of water main lines throughout the Village.

Beginning in mid September, WSSC contractors will begin to replace, upgrade and relocate the water main lines on various streets throughout the Village. The existing water mains are at the end of their useful lives. Many were installed in the early 1920's. The resulting work is intended to cause a notable reduction in the number of water main breaks experienced in the Village.

The **first step** in this project will be the installation of temporary above-ground water lines along the side of the roadway, which will connect to your existing home water line while the construction work is begin conducted. Only in cases where the existing water main lines are being replaced in the same location will WSSC's contractor install temporary above-ground water lines.

The **second step** in the process will involve the replacement, upgrade and/or relocation of the water mains. This process will include the excavation of a trench within the roadway to remove and replace the existing water main. During the construction process access to driveways will be maintained at all times and traffic control measures will be set-up to direct traffic in and around the work zone. WSSC anticipates that construction on a given block should take 2 – 4 weeks, weather permitting.

The **final steps** of the project will involve the restoration of the existing roadways and rights-of-way throughout the Village where WSSC has conducted its replacements and upgrades. Once a section of water main is replaced WSSC will temporarily repair the trench in the roadway surface to ensure traffic can safely traverse the roadway. After WSSC completes all of its water main replacement work within the Village, the affected roadways will be resurfaced with a layer of asphalt in an operation called "mill and overlay" (much the same as the Village's street repaving process).

Public Hearing Notice

The Chevy Chase Village Board of Managers will convene on Monday, September 12, 2011 at 7:30 p.m. to hold a public hearing to introduce and consider possible adoption of:

Resolution No. 09-01-11—An Ordinance to adopt a new Section 8-13 of the Chevy Chase Village Code to establish the position of Building Officer and to authorize and establish a process for Administrative Variances and Special Permits; and

Resolution No. 09-02-11—An Ordinance to amend Sections 8-27, 8-29, 8-30 and 8-31 of the Chevy Chase Village Code to provide that Licenses to Devote the Public Right of Way to Private Use may be issued only by the joint action of the Building Officer and the Village Manager; to provide that licenses shall be recorded in the Montgomery County Land Records unless recordation is waived; and to amend Section 6-2(a)(22) to establish a lower fee for licenses that are not recorded.

Approval of Previous Meetings' Minutes: June 13, 2011 Regular Session— approved.

Consent Agenda: Administrative Review of Case No. 5951: 27 Primrose Street—Construct a walkway on the Primrose Street public right-of-way. **A-5720 (Variance Extension Request): 11 West Melrose Street**—Extension of a previously-granted variance to complete construction of a two-story addition to the rear of an existing non-conforming house, the yet-to-be-installed gutter of which would encroach a maximum of 14' into the 20' rear setback—consent calendar.

Case No. 5950: 5803 Kirkside Drive—Install: (a) 9 Hornbeam trees, (b) 36 Boxwood, (c) a Laurel hedge row, (d) 4 Holly trees, (e) flagstone pavers, and (f) an irrigation system in the Kirkside Drive and Grafton Street public rights-of-way, respectively— approved.

Case No. 5960: 6000 Connecticut Avenue—Install: (a) 13 American Holly trees, (b) 1 Saucer Magnolia tree, (c) 1 Willow Oak tree, and (d) 44 American boxwood all in the Connecticut Avenue public right-of-way—deferred.

Appeals: A-5945 (a) and (b) (Retroactive Special Permit Request): 28 Hesketh Street—(a) Maintain a freestanding lamp-post in the Hesketh Street public right-of-way, located near the front walkway, 4'-2" from the public sidewalk; and (b) maintain pool equipment installed 12" from the rear (south) property line, both of which were installed prior to obtaining applicable permits—approved.

A-5956 (Retroactive Variance Request): 28 Hesketh Street—Maintain a freestanding lamppost on private property located forward of the front building restriction line, near the front walkway, measuring 6'-3" from the front property line that was installed prior to obtaining applicable permits—approved.

A-5949 (a), (b) & (c) (Special Permit Request): 5803 Kirkside Drive—(a) Replace an existing concrete driveway with a brick driveway that measures a maximum of 16' in width in the Kirkside Drive public right-of-way, (b) replace an existing concrete driveway with a brick driveway that measures a maximum of 20' in width on private property, and (c) install two gas lampposts in the Kirkside Drive public right-of-way—approved.

A-5952 (Variance Request): 27 Primrose Street—Construct a terrace on the west (side) of the house, a portion of which would encroach 40" forward of the front building restriction line—approved.

A-5959 (Retroactive Special Permit Request): 45 West Lenox Street—Modify an existing Building Permit to maintain pool equipment that encroaches 39" into the west (side) yard setback—deferred.

A-5809 (b) & (c) (Retroactive Variance Request): 45 West Lenox Street—(b) Maintain a pool deck, a portion of which was constructed 16 ³/₄" from the rear lot line, 7 ¹/₄" farther into the north (rear) setback than the previously approved variance; and (c) maintain a retaining wall and attached fence that has been erected in the rear yard, measuring a maximum of ten (10) feet in height along the north (rear) property line, and diminishing in height to 18" along a portion of the west (side) property line and 8" along a portion of the east (side) property line—deferred.

Committee Reports: Audit Committee—The Board approved the appointment of Peter Asmuth as Chair and Gail Feldman and John Elliott as members. **Budget Committee**—The Board approved the Committee's draft Scope of Work, and approved the appointment of Samuel Lawrence as Chair; Gail Feldman, William Kirby, Louis J. Morsberger, Lisa Sanders and Martin Dagata as members; and Lawrence Heilman and Gary Crockett as Board Liaisons to the Budget Committee. **Chevy Chase Open Space Committee (Wohlfarth)**—The Board approved the appointment of Meredith Wellington as Chair, and Diane Kartalia, Jay Treadwell, Nina Bang-Jensen, Peter Yeo, and Susie Eig as members, and David L. Winstead as Board Liaison. **Ethics Commission**—The Board approved the appointment of Margot Anderson to serve a three-year term, effective through July of 2014. **Personnel Commission**—The Board approved the appointment of Orrin Baird as Chair to serve for a three-year term, Michael Byars to serve a two-year term, and Gregory Ossi to serve a one-year term effective September 1. **Tree Committee**—The Board approved the appointment of Michael Denger as Chair.

Old Business: Public Hearing—Reconsideration of Resolution No. 05-02-11, which was adopted by the Board of Managers on May 16, 2011 and authorized the Board Chair to issue an Executive Order for the placement of a STOP sign for westbound traffic traveling on East Melrose Street, requiring traffic to stop at the intersection of East Melrose Street and Nevada Avenue. This sign is being reconsidered due to inadequate notice and information regarding the STOP sign request—no action taken.

Back to School Safety Tips for Parents and Children

It's that time of year. Summer has ended and children are headed out for another year of school. In order to ensure your child's safety, please remember these important safety tips.

Bus Stop Safety

Parents of children who ride the bus to school should take an active role in ensuring that children are transported to and from school safely and promptly, and that discipline and safety are maintained at bus stops.



Please check the times, locations, and route numbers for your child. Make note of any schedule changes which have been implemented for this year. Route numbers are displayed on the side window of each bus.

Drivers should remember that failure to yield to a stopped school bus that is operating alternately flashing red lights can result in a \$570.00 fine and carries a minimum of three points. Village officers have increased patrol of school bus stops to catch violators.

Bicycle and Walking Safety Tips

Students who ride bicycles or walk to school should follow some simple guidelines for safety:

- Always wear a helmet while riding a bike. County law requires that all children ages 17 and under wear a helmet while riding or being carried on a bicycle.
- Be cautious of vehicles and pedestrians, especially at intersections. Obey traffic signals and signs at all times.
- Walk or ride to school with a partner.
- Where available, students should always use sidewalks.

An Important Message from the Acting Chief of Police

Dear Residents,

The region has seen an increase in vehicle thefts and break-ins over the past few months. The Village Police Department is increasing night patrols to target the recent vehicle thefts and larcenies (theft from automobiles), including some surveillance techniques which are not readily apparent.

In addition, my staff and I are actively looking into technology that can aid our efforts in securing the public's safety as a supplement to our officer patrols; including, but not limited to, surveillance cameras and license plate readers. Given cost and privacy concerns, these options must be carefully researched and discussed with the Board of Managers and community prior to their purchase and implementation. Some of this technology is already in use, and residents should rest assured that all available resources are being brought to bear to combat these crimes.

In order to make our efforts more effective, we ask that residents lock their vehicles and remove any valuable items and report suspicious situations and activity (anything at all out of the ordinary) immediately to our 24-hour Communications Center at (301) 654-7300. Our goal is to make this community less desirable for criminal activity and that can only be done with the community and police force work together.

During the entire water main replacement process, WSSC and its contractors will work Monday – Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. In the event that WSSC contractors must turn off water service advance notice will be provided by WSSC to the affected houses detailing the anticipated duration. WSSC inspectors are required to go door to door notifying residents three (3) days prior to a shutdown and leave information at the front door. WSSC has assured the Village that water shut-offs will not exceed eight (8) hours and will not be scheduled on the day before, day of or the day after the following holidays: New Years Day, Good Friday, Easter, beginning of Passover, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, Thanksgiving, Hanukkah and Christmas.

Recycling collection for residents EAST of Connecticut Avenue will be collected on , Friday, September 9.


