### **ANNUAL MEETING NOTES**

The 103rd Chevy Chase Annual Meeting was held on Monday, April 17. The evening began with light refreshments and an opportunity for attending residents, including Board Members and members of the Village's Commissions and Committees, to socialize.

Chair of the Village's Board of Managers Mr. Michael Denger began the Annual Meeting by presenting the State of the Village report (see below article). The Board adopted the budget for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2018 and levied a tax on real property at a rate of \$.0819 per \$100 of assessed value (fair market value), and at a rate of \$.66 per \$100 of assessed value on personal property.

#### STATE OF THE VILLAGE REPORT

Mr. Michael Denger, Chair of the Chevy Chase Village Board of Managers, presented the State of the Village report during the 103rd Annual Meeting. Below is a summary of Mr. Denger's report on Village activity over the last five years:

## THE COLLECTION AT CHEVY CHASE RE-DEVELOPMENT

The Chevy Chase Land Company, owners of The Collection at Chevy Chase, formerly referred to as "Chevy Chase Center", are working to obtain the final various approvals required for them to proceed in their redevelopment of the shopping center. These approvals include the Village's agreement to allow the creation of a traffic roundabout on Montgomery Street west of the Buffer. Village officials are finalizing the terms of the agreement, which will require Village Board approval.

The Land Company expects to begin construction on the Center in mid-summer 2017 and should be completed in early to mid-2018. The project will be done in phases since the center will remain open during construction. The first phase of the project will focus on the westernmost internal roadway including the new plaza, followed by the changes in Farr Park, the roadway reconfiguration at the entrance closest to Clyde's restaurant and along Wisconsin Circle, and then the changes near the Western Avenue entrance. The Montgomery Street roundabout is projected to be the final phase.

- Received an independent assessment of the Village's liability and property insurance coverage options that concluded we stay with our current provider, The Local Government Insurance Trust
- The Village worked with Washington Gas to replace 75% of our water, 10% of our sewer, and 95% of our gas lines during Fiscal Years (FY) 2014 through 2016
- In FY2015 approximately seven miles of roadway was repaved
- Starting in FY2012 and spanning four years thereafter, nine miles of sidewalk were replaced with clay brick pavers
- The Public Works offices and lounge on the basement level of the Village Hall was renovated in FY2012
- In FY2014, a Village Hall Security System was implemented for improved control of access to the Village Hall
- Various repairs and improvements were made to the Village Hall including a full roof replacement, new gutters and landscaping, and repairing of the Public Works yard
- In April 2017 the Village Hall parking lot was brought into compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act
- Completed new traffic plan improving vehicular and pedestrian traffic access to and around the Village Hall in FY2016
- Members of the Board, Traffic Committee and staff worked with the State Highway Administration to install a painted crosswalk and flashing warning beacon for pedestrians to cross Connecticut Avenue in the vicinity of the Village Hall
- Revised Village traffic control signage, including modifications to the entrances to Grafton and Oliver Streets at Kirkside Drive
- Installed a one way traffic camera to photograph cars exiting Grafton Street unlawfully onto Wisconsin Avenue
- For the Police Department we purchased three new cruisers and one unmarked vehicle equipped for police use
- Parks throughout the Village have been re-landscaped to increase enjoyment of them by residents
- Continued work with Friends of Chevy Chase Circle as they work to improve and enhance the Circle
- Over the last five years, the Village planted 300 new trees in Village rights-of-way, parks and greenspaces
- The Board implemented a Private Property Tree Reforestation Incentive Program, which provides reimbursement for up to 50% or up to \$175 per tree, which ever is lesser, of the cost to purchase and install a qualifying tree on their property
- Revision of the Ethics Ordinance and Ethics Disclosure form
- Creation of the Tree Ordinance Board to review tree removal appeals and present a consent agreement for Board action
- Creation of the Village Building Officer to consider Administrative Variances and Special Permits
- Continued collaboration with the Chevy Chase Land Company regarding the redevelopment of Chevy Chase Center
- Reviewed committee structures and made revisions, including creating the Community Relations Committee
- Continued consumer-related Village initiatives including the Composting Program
- Disseminated new 64 gallon recycling toters to Village Residents to help avoid unnecessary separation of recyclable materials

#### COMMISSION/COMMITTEE ANNUAL REPORTS

During the Village's Annual Meeting held the evening of April 17, ten commissions/committees presented reports outlining their activities over the past year and their goals for the coming year. Below is a synopsis of each presentation.

- Community Relations Committee: Former Chair Karen Spangler stated that over the last year the Committee hosted a Parents Night Out, collaborated with A Wider Circle to collect and provide to those in need food and clothing items, coordinated a lecture on the Spirit and Character of French Gardens led by resident Vanessa Badre, and hosted the Fall Social to welcome new residents to the community. Ms. Spangler introduced Michael Marsh, the newly appointed Chair of the committee. Mr. Marsh advised that the committee is planning to host a monthly (October through May) speaker series featuring Village residents.
- Ethics Commission: Chair Frank (Scot) McCulloch stated that the Village had no ethical misconduct investigations over the past year and that the commission reviewed financial disclosure statements submitted by candidates for the Board of Managers and from required appointed officials.
- **Financial Review Committee**: Chair Gail Feldman stated that the committee continues to review the annual budget, investment of Village funds and the annual audit. The Village received a clean audit for the fiscal year that ended on June 30, 2016.
- **Public Safety Committee**: Chair Saul Goodman reported that the Committee continues to work with the Board of Managers and police department on public safety matters and initiatives.

- Traffic Committee: Chair Porter Wheeler stated they have had informal discussions about the status of the pedestrian crossing installation on Connecticut Avenue and Lenox Street and the need for a fully-actuated signal. The committee has recently reviewed proposed amendments to the speed hump policy and continues to work with the Board and staff on other traffic-related matters.
- Western Grove Park Friends Group: Chair Meredith Wellington stated they have raised \$140,000 in private donations, and that will be enough to finish the Park which is scheduled to open after Labor Day.
- Environment & Energy Committee: Co-Chair Dr. Marilyn Braken stated they organized a Sustainable Living Lecture Series, worked with the Board of Managers to circulate a letter to residents regarding noise and environment pollution generated by leaf blowers, continued monitoring of the county's implementation of its Healthy Lawns Bill 52-14, assessed the effectiveness of recycling efforts, and collaborated with neighboring communities and organizations to identify good environmental practices.
- Parks and Greenspaces Committee: Co-Chair Susan Kilborn provided an update on the various park development plans implemented by the Village, including providing input on the pending redevelopment of the Brookville Road Park.
- Seniors Committee: Chair Betty O'Connor stated that she had organized about twenty programs in conjunction with the local area aging in place organization, Chevy Chase@Home, including, a Holiday Party, a Saint Patrick's Day party, fire inspections, medical speakers series, balance therapy classes, and an Alive Inside program that uses music to help those with dementia.
- Election Supervisors: The Election Supervisors welcomed new member Paul Broderick. Chair Charlotte Jones Carroll stated that there were four candidates for four vacancies on the Board; thereby declaring the four candidates, all incumbents, elected. The reelected members are: Gary Crockett (Grafton Street), Minh Le (Oliver Street), Richard Ruda (Newlands Street), and David Winstead (Kirkside Drive).

Village Manager Ms. Shana Davis-Cook presented a summary of the administrative staff's work over the past year, including:

- The Village received a clean audit thanks to the diligence of Finance Director Demetri Protos
- Welcomed new Community Liaison/Administrative Assistant Ms. Tamu Tucker
- Working with the Community Relations Committee, the staff welcomed 12 new families to the community

Be a considerate neighbor (and comply with the Village Code) by mowing the grass and pruning back any overgrowth that interferes with pedestrian use of the sidewalks abutting your property. Clearing these obstacles will continue to make the Village pedestrian, stroller, and bicycle friendly and safe for all.

#### Leash Law Reminder

Many residents are enjoying the warmer weather by taking



strolls through the neighborhood with their dogs. The Chevy Chase Village Police Department reminds residents that the law requires that all dogs be on a leash, otherwise they are classified as being "atlarge." This county-wide law states

that a dog must be leashed when outside the owner's premises unless it is in a government-designated dog exercise area. Fines for dogs off leash begin at \$100 for a first offense and go up to \$500. The law also requires all owners/handlers to clean up after their pet.

Please be a responsible dog owner by keeping your dog leashed and cleaning up after your pet.

## **Home Security Surveys**

The Village Police Department offers free confidential home security surveys. These surveys are used as a tool to identify weak

areas of your home's security. Simple remedies can make your home safer and more secure.

# Protect your identity Don't put outgoing mail in your mail slot

Placing outgoing mail in your mail slot may put you at risk for identity theft. Often, the outgoing item sits for hours until the mail carrier comes by, and in the meantime, a thief may take the item. It has happened to several residents. Although the convenience makes it tempting to put it in the slot, please use one of the local mail boxes, or stop by our Post Office on the north end of the Village hall.

#### Please Lock Your Vehicles



The vast majority of our thefts are from unlocked cars. We make it far too easy (and inviting) for thieves when we fail to lock our cars. The Village Police Department urges you to lock your car doors every time you park. And remove all

valuables—or hide them at the very least. Please do your civic duty and reduce the opportunities for thieves and discourage them from taking things from your vehicle.

## **Noise Start Times Enforced**

With the weather getting warmer, many residents are hiring landscape crews and other contractors to maintain and make improvements to their properties. These contractors typically like to start early so they can avoid the heat of the day.

Residents are encouraged to remind their contractors and landscape crews that the Village noise ordinance prohibits the use of motorized equipment prior to 8:00 a.m. on weekdays and prior to 9:00 a.m. on weekends and holidays. The noise regulations are strictly enforced by citation and fine.

April showers bring May flowers – and May is also special for mothers. "**Happy Mother's Day**" to all our mothers, grandmothers and all those who share in the care of our children.

May 16 – 7:00-9:30 P.M. "The Intelligence Cold War in Western Europe: KGB vs. CIA" David Duberman, a Chevy Chase resident, will share some of his experiences serving in the CIA. David, a retired senior CIA officer, will discuss two outstanding intelligence operations run by the KGB and the CIA. The KGB operation involved five upper class Cambridge graduates (the Cambridge Five), who provided the Soviet Union with secret intelligence for many years.

The second operation was brilliantly conducted in Moscow during the Cold War by an elite group of CIA operations officers. They managed to meet a high intelligence source under the eyes of the KGB despite the KGB's complete control of the operational environment. This operation, until its tragic end, provided important intelligence to the United States.

Mr. Duberman will also share some of his personal knowledge which included friendships with several of the officers in Moscow. We encourage you to invite your friends and neighbors to enjoy this unique look into a part of our national history.


