Dispose of Unused Medication Properly and Easily at the Village Hall

Your Village Police Department is participating in a national medication take-back day on Saturday, April 26 from 10:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. Law enforcement agencies throughout the region are participating. Simply bring your unused prescription or OTC medication (no liquids or needles, please!) to the Village Hall and drop it in the box that will be attended by a police officer. The Police Department will dispose of the medication properly.

Also: We now have a secure 24-hour medication drop box inside the Village Hall. Feel free to drop any unwanted medications into the box. No liquids, gels or needles, please!

Protesters May Make a Brief Appearance in the Village this Weekend

You may recall that, in previous years at this time, several busloads of protesters from a group called National People's Action spontaneously protested outside a private residence in the 4000 block of Oliver Street. The group was large and loud, and they began to disperse and get back on the buses after about 15 minutes.

National People's Action is holding their annual conference in Washington, DC this weekend, and while we do not know for sure, there is a possibility that they may once again come to Oliver Street. NPA has a history of peaceful protests, and we expect that any inconvenience will be brief. Village police have been in regular contact with officials in the Montgomery County Police Department, and we will work together to keep the peace.

Three Unlocked Cars Entered on Grafton Street

Nothing Taken

Three unlocked cars were entered overnight Tuesday, 4/22-Wednesday, 4/23 in the 100 block of Grafton Street. All three cars had been parked in the homeowners' driveways. Two of the cars were parked at one home, and the third car was parked at the home next door. In each case,

the glove compartments and center consoles were left wide open, but nothing was taken from any of the cars.

Residents are reminded that they must deny criminals the opportunity to commit crimes in the Village by locking their cars every time they park, removing valuables from their cars, leaving front and rear porch lights on all night long, and by calling the police whenever they hear or see something suspicious.
